Evidence based approach to tackling domestic abuse

Police Scotland has drawn upon strong and effective partnership working to develop an evidence based approach to tackling domestic abuse. This input will provide an overview of this approach and provide information on current and future practice.

Rape and the criminal justice process - new developments in advocacy support

Longstanding concerns about the criminal justice response to rape have prompted the development of victim advocacy services across a range of jurisdictions, yet research evidence about the nature, value and efficacy of these services remains limited.

This presentation highlights key findings from a study evaluating an innovative pilot advocacy model introduced in Scotland to assist victims/survivors reporting rape to the police. It will conclude by considering implications for future advocacy work, including the recent introduction of a new National Advocacy Project by Rape Crisis Scotland.
